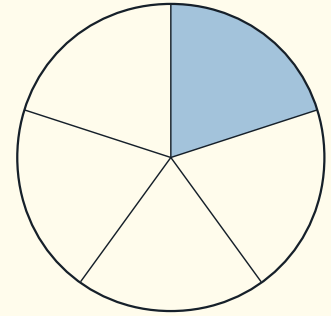


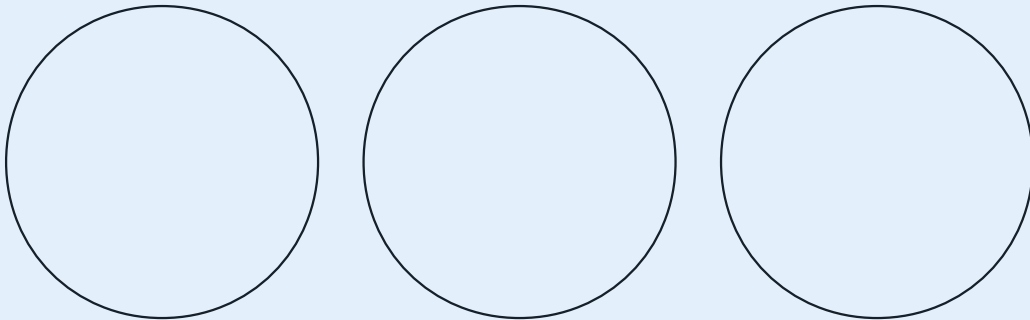
## NAMING ONE FIFTH

- 1 The whole is cut into 5 equal parts.
- 2 1 of those parts is shaded.
- 3 The fraction is written  $\frac{1}{5}$ .



## WARM-UP

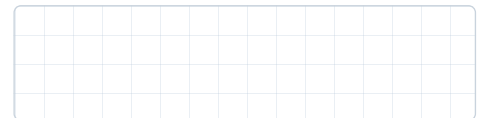
Slice each circle into equal parts and shade to show the fraction.



1. Slice the first pizza into 4 equal parts and shade 1 part to show  $\frac{1}{4}$ .
2. Slice the second pizza into 3 equal parts and shade 2 parts to show  $\frac{2}{3}$ .
3. Slice the third pizza into 5 equal parts and shade 2 parts to show  $\frac{2}{5}$ .
