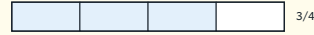


**READING €0.75 TWO WAYS**

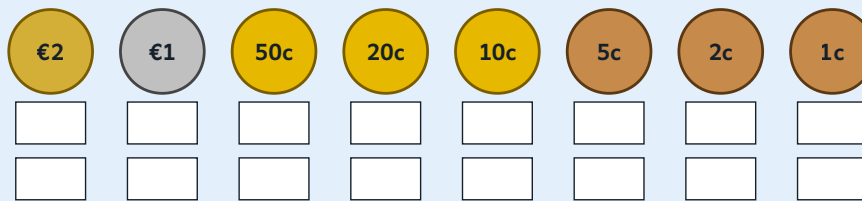
- 1 Look at the digits after the point: **75**. These are the cent.
- 2 There are **100** cent in one euro, so €0.75 is **75** out of **100** cent.
- 3  $€0.75 = 75/100 = 3/4$ , three quarters of a euro (see the strip).



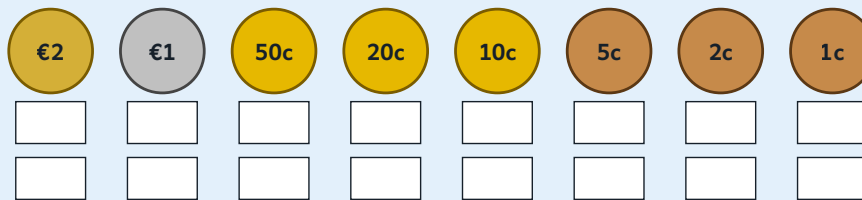
 **WARM-UP**

**Build each amount on the coin mat and write it as a fraction or in cent.**

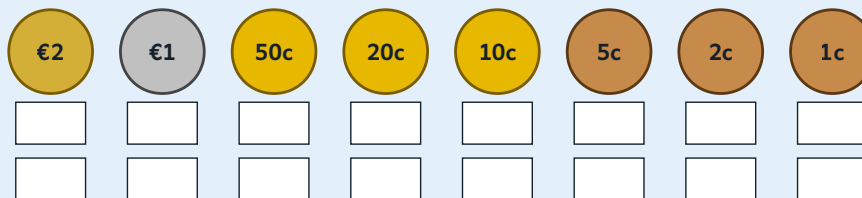
1. Lay out coins to make €0.50, then write it as one half of a euro.

- 1 A carton of milk costs €0.50 in the shop. Write that price as a fraction of a euro.
- 2 A bar of chocolate costs €0.75. Write that price as a fraction of a euro.
