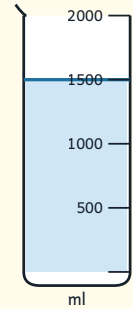


- 1 litre = **1,000** ml.
- Keep the extra **500** ml.
- Add: $1,000 + 500 = \mathbf{1,500}$ ml.

1. Set out and work $3\text{ l} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ ml}$ and $4\text{ l} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ ml}$, multiplying each by 1,000.
2. Set out and work $2,000\text{ ml} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ l}$ and $2,500\text{ ml} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ l } \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ ml}$, dividing by 1,000.
3. Set out and work the mixed amount $1\text{ l } 250\text{ ml} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ ml}$, then rename $1,750\text{ ml} = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ l } \underline{\hspace{1cm}}\text{ ml}$.

1 A shop sells cooking oil in 3 l bottles. How many millilitres of oil is in one bottle?

Aoife renames 3 litres in millilitres like this:

$$1 \text{ l} = 100 \text{ ml}$$
$$\text{So } 3 \text{ l} = 3 \times 100 = 300 \text{ ml}$$

Find Aoife's mistake. What is 3 l in millilitres?

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
