

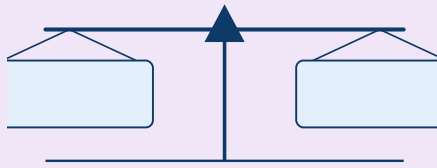
SAOIRSE AND HER STICKERS

- 1 Read the family story: Saoirse had some stickers. She got 4 more. Now she has 10 stickers.
- 2 The words 'got more' tell us to add. The start amount is unknown so we use a box.
- 3 Say the number sentence out loud: $\square + 4 = 10$.
- 4 Find what fills the box so the balance beam hangs level: the box is 6 because $6 + 4$ makes 10.

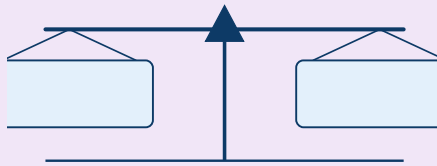
WARM-UP

Use the balance scales to make both sides equal for each story sentence.

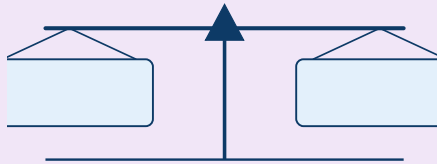
1. Put 5 on the left pan and balance it with 4 and the box to show $5 + 4 = \square$



2. Put the box and 4 on the left pan to balance 10 on the right for $\square + 4 = 10$



3. Put 8 on the left pan and balance it with the box to equal 15 for $8 + \square = 15$
