

NAMING A TRIANGLE BY ITS SIDES

- 1 A paper triangle has sides of 7 cm, 7 cm and 7 cm.
- 2 Compare the sides: all **three** are the same length.
- 3 A triangle with all three sides equal is **equilateral**.

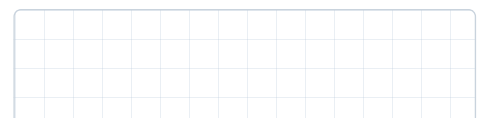
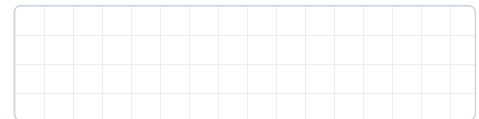
WARM-UP

- 3 Tom glues straws of 14 cm, 16 cm and 19 cm into a triangle. Which family is it?
- 4 A workshop cuts a metal triangle with every side 10 cm long for a yield sign. Name its family.

'Two sides are equal, so it is equilateral.'
