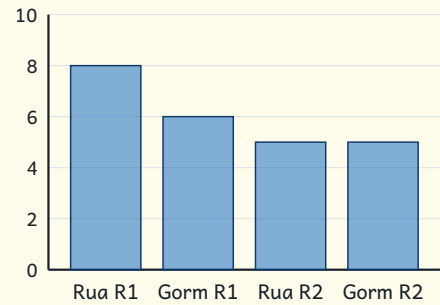


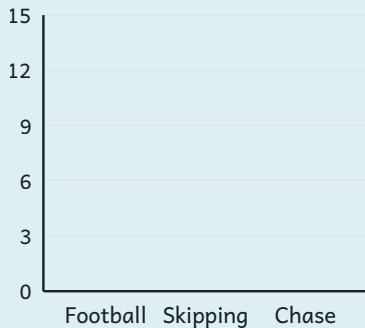
COMPARING TWO TEAMS' QUIZ SCORES

- Both charts use the same scale. Rua scored **8** in Round 1 and Gorm scored **6**.
- Rua's bar is higher: **8** is more than **6**, so Rua won Round 1 by $8 - 6 = 2$.
- In Round 2 both teams scored **5**, so those bars are the same height.



WARM-UP

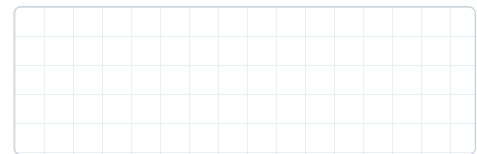
Draw two bars for each game, one for Rang Rua and one for Rang Gorm, using the counts named.



- Draw Rang Rua's bars: football to 12, skipping to 8 and chase to 7.
- Draw Rang Gorm's bars beside them: football to 9, skipping to 8 and chase to 4.
- Circle the game where both bars are the same height, and put a star over the taller bar for football.

PRACTICE

- At break the two classes picked their favourite game. Rang Rua picked football **12** times and Rang Gorm picked it **9** times. Who is higher and by how much?
- The games club counted plays over two weeks. Board games were played **15** times then **11** times; card games were played **6** times then **10** times. By how much did each game change?
