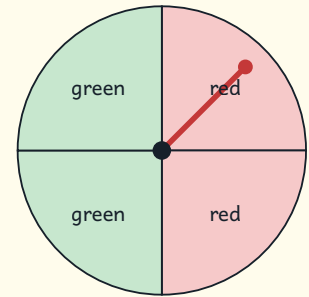


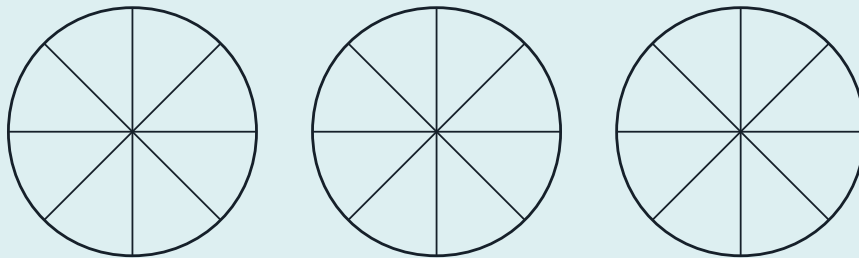
CERTAIN AND IMPOSSIBLE

- 1 The spinner has 4 equal sections: 2 red and 2 green.
- 2 There is no blue section at all, so landing on blue is **impossible**.
- 3 Every section is a colour, so the arrow is **certain** to land on a colour.



WARM-UP

Shade each circle so the likelihood word underneath it is true. You decide how many of the 8 parts to shade.



1. Circle 1: shade it so landing on a shaded part is CERTAIN.
2. Circle 2: shade it so landing on a shaded part is IMPOSSIBLE.
3. Circle 3: shade some parts red and the rest green so landing on red is an EVEN CHANCE.
