WHAT THIS LESSON DOES

Students build a JavaScript weather web app in CodePen that fetches live data and displays it for a chosen location, then explain where the data comes from and how the app retrieves it.

CURRICULUM OUTCOMES

3.1	Creatively design and write code for short programming tasks, demonstrating operators for assignment, arithmetic, comparison and Boolean combinations.
2.2	Describe how data is transported through protocols.

WHAT STUDENTS SHOULD BE ABLE TO DO

- Build a web app that shows real weather data (LO 2.5, LO 3.1)
- Explain where the data comes from and how the app fetches it (LO 2.2)

BEFORE THE BELL

- Students logged in to the platform with devices ready and CodePen open in the browser
- Confirm network access so API calls to OpenWeatherMap and Unsplash can run
- Have a sample Irish place name ready (for example Dublin or Galway) for the class demo
- Optional: open a blank pen on the board so the first setup steps can be modelled

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HOW THE LESSON RUNS

TEACHING MOVES

- Model the first CodePen setup and the jQuery link on the board before pairs continue alone
- When the fetch step arrives, pause and ask where the weather numbers are coming from before anyone pastes further
- Point the default location at an Irish town so the live data feels relevant
- Treat debugging as a named skill: when something fails, ask what they expected, what they saw, and which line to check first

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- jQuery or Font Awesome link missing or in the wrong panel, so icons or script calls fail: check the external resources list matches the step
- Place name spelling or empty location so the API returns an error: try a clear Irish city name and re-run
- Click handler for the temperature toggle not attached, so Celsius and Fahrenheit never switch: confirm the listener sits after the update function and the element id matches

DIFFERENTIATION

- Support: Provide a finished HTML shell so students focus on the fetch and display steps
- Support: Stay on one fixed Irish location until the app runs cleanly before any search feature
- Extension: Add a city search bar or show extra fields such as feels-like, sunrise or sunset from the same response
