WHAT THIS LESSON TEACHES

1 litre equals 1000 cm^3 or 1000 ml so the same space can be measured in different units.→ A milk carton holds 1 litre which is 1000 cm^3 .→ A 10 cm cube holds 1000 cm^3 or 1 litre.

MODEL THIS ON THE BOARD

CHANGING 3000 cm^3 INTO LITRES

- 1 Begin with the volume of 3000 cm^3
- 2 Divide by 1000 because 1000 cm^3 fill one litre
- 3 The answer is 3 litres

ANSWER KEY

a) 3 l

b) 1500 ml

c) 0.75 l

Q1: 5 litres

Q2: 1,500 ml

Q3: 0.75 litres

Q4: 1 litre

Q5: 2,000 ml

Q6: 4,000 cm^3 a) Always — The rule says 1 litre fills exactly 1000 cm^3 .

b) Never — 750 ml is always less than 1000 ml.

c) Always — Divide 3000 by 1000 to get exactly 3 litres.

d) Never — A 10 cm cube always holds exactly 1000 cm^3 or 1 litre.
